FY23 CPD Accreditation Cohort Annual Report

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Introduction

Law enforcement agency (LEA) accreditation is a self-initiated process of adopting and maintaining standardized policies and procedures. LEAs operate within a specific set of state- and nationally recognized standards that are determined and defined by accreditation bodies. To obtain accreditation, an LEA must work with a state or national accreditation body to develop and adopt a specific set of operational standards, the number of which varies by accreditation entity, and maintain compliance during the accreditation period. Tribal LEAs may seek accreditation through either state or national accreditation bodies.

The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office) support agency accreditation and recognize the importance of adhering to the highest standards of policies and operations. The community benefits when its law enforcement personnel follow standardized policies and procedures that provide efficient, effective, and fair policing. Agency accreditation helps to ensure the accountability and transparency that can enhance community confidence and trust in law enforcement.

Since 2021, the COPS Office has supported accreditation efforts through a separate funding opportunity of the Community Policing Development (CPD) program. Accreditation solicitations vary from year to year but have included the following subcategories:

- Addressing Gaps in State Accreditation. Establishment of accreditation entities in states that do not have an accreditation body.
- Enhancing Existing Law Enforcement Accreditation Entities. Support and enhancement of existing law enforcement accreditation bodies to increase the number of agencies accredited.
- Supporting Law Enforcement Agencies in Seeking Accreditation. Funds costs such
 as officer overtime, accreditation fees, and policy software related to obtaining law
 enforcement accreditation from an existing state or national law enforcement accreditation entity.
- Accreditation Resources and Implementation Support. Development of a national
 marketing program and provision of technical assistance in support of law enforcement accreditation.
- Supporting Tribal Agency Accreditation. Support of an accreditation body in assisting tribal law enforcement agencies through the accreditation process. [Offered in 2021 only]

Accreditation Awards

In 2023, the COPS Office received 103 accreditation applications across all subcategories and funded 47 organizations and agencies for \$8,139,568 (see appendix A for the full list of recipients). The FY 2023 funding is a significant increase from the FY 2022 total of \$3,800,738, with a similar number of applicants (in FY22 there were 109 applications across all subcategories and 56 funded organizations and agencies). The FY 2023 funding included three awards under Addressing Gaps in State Accreditation, eight awards under Enhancing Existing Law Enforcement Accreditation Entities, one award under Accreditation Resources and Implementation Support, and 35 awards under the Supporting Law Enforcement Agencies in Seeking Accreditation category.




Figure 1. Types of law enforcement agencies funded in 2023 by agency type (n=35)

For the Supporting Law Enforcement Agencies in Seeking Accreditation category, the 35 recipients include 23 municipalities, five sheriffs' offices, five campus agencies, and two state level agencies across 18 states (see figure 1).

CPD Accreditation cohort

To manage the Accreditation cooperative agreements and grants, a team of Community Policing Advancement (CPA) Directorate staff, termed the Accreditation Cohort, works cooperatively with all recipients to support award management and oversight. In addition, the Accreditation Cohort provides technical assistance to support project management and implementation, as well as training opportunities via multimedia resources—for example, a webinar to highlight successes and lessons learned for other agencies seeking accreditation.


Since October 2022, the Accreditation Cohort's accomplishments have included the following:

- Individual kickoff meetings for all cooperative agreement recipients in the fall of 2022
- A kickoff meeting for 2022 grant award recipients on December 1, 2022 with 81 individual attendees, at which the following topics were presented:
 - Overview of COPS Office
 - Accreditation Award Overview and Objectives
 - Award Package and Recipient Materials
 - JustGrants Navigation
 - Summary
- Internal coordination via regular meetings and communication channels
- Maintenance of the Law Enforcement Agency (LEA) Accreditation web page
 (https://cops.usdoj.gov/LEA_accreditation), which launched in the Community Policing
 Topics resources section of the COPS Office website on May 19, 2022, and has an interactive map of state and national accreditation bodies with links to the organizations and links to resources and publications related to accreditation and is updated on a regular basis by the cohort
- Coordination of two articles for the *Community Policing Dispatch* monthly newsletter on accreditation topics:
 - In the October 2022 issue, "The New Mexico Association of Counties Adds Sheriffs' <u>Accreditation Program</u>." This article describes the development of a new law enforcement accreditation program for county sheriff's offices in the state.
 - In the November 2023 issue, "Accreditation for Tribal Law Enforcement: Voices from the Field." This article describes four tribal law enforcement agencies that have discovered the benefits of accreditation.

Agency Accreditation Progress

COPS Office funding allows award recipients to obtain any state or national accreditation. Generally, accreditation is a five-step process: (1) enrollment, (2) self-assessment, (3) assessment, (4) commission review and decision, and (5) maintaining compliance and reaccreditation. All of the 15 law enforcement agency accreditation awards that have ended saw significant progress toward achieving accreditation, with five achieving accreditation during the grant period.

Future Accreditation Support

In FY 2023 the COPS Office funded a new project under the *Accreditation Resources and Implementation Support* solicitation. This solicitation was intended to aid in the development of a national marketing program and provision of technical assistance in support of law enforcement accreditation, especially for agencies that have been funded under the COPS Office Law Enforcement Agencies Seeking Accreditation program. The National Policing Institute (NPI) was selected as the recipient under this solicitation.

NPI will (1) develop a national outreach and marketing campaign, working collaboratively with state- and national-level accreditation bodies to (a) reach nonaccredited agencies, with a particular emphasis on smaller agencies, and (b) promote the sustainment of accreditation among agencies that have already achieved accreditation and (2) establish a peer-to-peer virtual community of practice for COPS Office Supporting LEAs Seeking Accreditation grantees using NPI's existing expertise and capabilities through the Higher Logic online community platform.
