Scott H. Decker is Foundation Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice at Arizona State University. He has a Ph.D. in Criminology and has written sixteen books and more than 180 articles about criminal justice, policing and gangs. Decker served for 5 years as a member of the Arizona Police Officer Standards and Training board, and has directed the study of the Missouri Traffic Stop Analysis (Racial Profiling) since 2000. For 12 year he was a member of the Missouri Sentencing Commission and served 12 years on the St. Louis Mayor's Crime Commission. In addition, he was a member of the national training team for Project Safe Neighborhoods and provided training to law enforcement, prosecution, corrections, community corrections and community members for 93 of the 94 judicial districts. Decker is a Subject Matter Expert for the Office of Justice Programs Diagnostic Center and the Smart Policing Initiative. He led the St. Louis Homicide Project for 14 years, including a community initiative. In 1985 he conducted a study of police training in St. Louis City and County. During the course of Decker's career, he has conducted dozens of in-service trainings and analyses for local, state and federal law enforcement groups including state and local law enforcement in more than a dozen states and twenty cities. He has conducted training for the F.B.I National Academy, Police Foundation, Police Executive Research Forum, the RCMP, London Metropolitan Police, Oslo, Amsterdam and Copenhagen police. Decker has also provided in-service training in institutional corrections, community corrections, juvenile justice and restorative justice.
