

THE PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE ON 21ST CENTURY POLICING

Vincent Talucci

The International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), founded in 1893, is a nonprofit association with 23,000 members from more than 100 countries around the world. Vincent Talucci was unanimously appointed as Executive Director by IACP's Executive Committee on April 7, 2014.

As Executive Director, Mr. Talucci is responsible for ensuring the IACP builds upon the Association's rich, steeped history by forging new, strategic policy directions. With the IACP's Executive Committee, and through a staff of more than 100 professionals, Mr. Talucci leads the Association's education, outreach, and advocacy efforts designed to address operational and policy challenges facing today's and tomorrow's law enforcement leaders. In addition, Mr. Talucci is charged with cultivating relationships with the public, private, and nonprofit sectors to further IACP's goals, address member needs, and advance the law enforcement field. Prior to his appointment as Executive Director, Mr. Talucci served as IACP's Deputy Executive Director. As Deputy Executive Director, he worked closely with the Executive Director to advance the policy objectives of the Association and was responsible for IACP's day-to-day business operations.

In 2012, Mr. Talucci returned to the IACP with new perspective gained by his private sector experiences. Mr. Talucci served as Director of the IACP's Programs and Research Activities Directorate and oversaw a broad range of core association services: information technology; police operations and management evaluations; promotional testing; executive search and placement; and oversight of federally-sponsored efforts including the National Law Enforcement Model Policy Center, Discover Policing, and IACP Center for Social Media.

From 2010 to 2012, Mr. Talucci left the IACP to enter the private sector. He served as Principal Advisor for Law Enforcement, State and Local Government Practice, with SAS, a worldwide software industry leader in predictive analytics and information integration services. SAS is regularly heralded as one of the best companies to work for in the United States.

From 2002 to 2010, Mr. Talucci served with the IACP, progressing to Director of the Division of State and Provincial Police (S&P). As S&P Director, he was responsible for: facilitating the efforts of the S&P Executive Committee; forging strategic directions to address critical issues facing state and provincial law enforcement; and, leading efforts in information sharing, homeland security, traffic safety, and innovative technology.

Before joining IACP, Mr. Talucci worked with the National Institute of Justice, USDOJ, where his responsibilities included the substantive and programmatic management of national scope criminal justice initiatives.

Mr. Talucci completed his undergraduate work at Rutgers University and holds a Master's degree in Public Administration from the University of Washington.
